Hernandez joins ranks of 1,300 credentialed in earning prestigious honor

WASHINGTON, D.C. (July 13, 2015) — Nickolaus Hernandez, city manager of the City of Arkansas City, recently received the Credentialed Manager designation from the International City/County Management Association (ICMA).

Hernandez is gualified by his eight years of professional local government executive experience.

Prior to his appointment in 2011 as city manager of Arkansas City, he served as city manager of Osage City from 2008 to 2011. Before that, he was a management intern and management assistant from 2007 to 2008 with the City of Salina.

"It is hard for someone to truly become part of a close-knit community like Arkansas City, but in my mind, Nick has done that," Giles said.

Hernandez received his bachelor of science degree in justice studies, with a minor in political science, from Fort Hays State University in 2005. He later earned a master of public administration degree from Wichita State University in 2007, with certificates in public finance and city management.

Highlights of Hernandez's ICMA membership include serving as vice president of the Kansas Association of City/County Management. He will become the organization's president this fall. Hernandez also served as its secretary from 2013 to 2014 and was a board member from 2011 to 2012.
