City manager named president of Kansas professional group

Hernandez new president of Kan. Association of City-County Management

ARKANSAS CITY, Kan. (December 14, 2015) — City Manager Nick Hernandez is the newest president of the Kansas Association of City-County Management (KACM).

Hernandez, who had been serving as vice president, was inducted as KACM's new president during its fall conference Dec. 4 in McPherson. He will serve a term of one year, through January 2017.

"I appreciate the trust my professional colleagues have shown in me with this appointment," he said.

"I look forward to continuing the good work that KACM does, and growing as both a leader and a peer of other administrators who face the same challenges I do each day."

The KACM president is elected by the organization's board of directors, and is responsible for administering meetings of the board and of the entire KACM membership.

- Donald Cawby, Osawatomie city manager, as treasurer.

Diane Stoddard, Lawrence assistant city manager, will serve as past president. There are nine other city managers and administrators who serve on the KACM board of directors.

Hernandez also is a member of the International City-County Management Association (ICMA). He received ICMA's Credentialed Manager designation earlier this year.

He is one of more than 1,300 local government management professionals currently credentialed through the ICMA Voluntary Credentialing Program, and one of just 28 currently serving in Kansas.

Hernandez has more than eight years of professional local government executive experience.

Prior to his appointment in 2011 as city manager of Arkansas City, he served as city manager of Osage City from 2008 to 2011. Before that, he was a management intern and management assistant from 2007 to 2008 with the City of Salina.

Hernandez received his bachelor of science degree in justice studies, with a minor in political science, from Fort Hays State University in 2005. He later earned a master of public administration degree from Wichita State University in 2007, with certificates in public finance and city management.
